RELIGION

This term will be a busy term. Confirmation will be a focus for the first few weeks as many students will be preparing for this special sacrament. The overarching theme this year is the Year of Hope, this will continue for term 4. Two religion units will be completed this term. The first is about Australian Catholic history and the challenges that were faced. Students will be exploring how the catholic faith shaped various communities in Australia. The second unit will be about Mother Mary. This will lead onto Christmas and the importance of Mary in Jesus' life.

ENGLISH

Throughout Term 4, Year 5/6 students will be exploring the novel *Rivet Boy* by Barbara Henderson as a mentor text. This engaging work of historical fiction is set in Victorian-era Scotland and follows twelve-year-old John Nicol, who takes a dangerous job on the construction of the iconic Forth Bridge to support his struggling family.

Blending real historical events with a compelling coming-of-age narrative, the novel explores themes of resilience, courage, and the power of education. As John faces physical and emotional challenges on the bridge site, he also finds solace in books, a local library, and the support of unexpected friendships. Rivet Boy provides rich opportunities for students to explore character development, historical context, and author intent. While the novel itself is a narrative text, it will be used as a springboard for developing persuasive writing skills. Students will examine how language can influence opinion and emotion, drawing on themes and issues from the story to construct well-reasoned arguments and persuasive texts. They will learn to use persuasive devices, structure arguments effectively, and write with clarity and conviction.

To strengthen overall literacy skills, students will participate in handwriting sessions twice a week, focusing on improving letter formation, legibility, and writing fluency. They will also take part in regular typing practice to enhance their speed and accuracy when using digital tools. In addition, oral reading fluency activities will be conducted three times a week to build students' confidence, expression, and reading pace—further supporting their comprehension and language development.

MATHEMATICS

Year 5/6 will be teaching explicit lessons using the Ochre Education resource as a base. Students will be divided into year level groups to develop proficiency and fluency of concepts across all curriculum strands.

SCIENCE

This term, Students are working through two science units. The first unit focuses on extending their understanding of solids, liquids, and gases by investigating solutions and mixtures. The second explores how processes such as weathering, erosion, transportation, and deposition contribute to changes in the Earth's surface over time.

HEALTH

Students are learning about strategies to manage changes and transitions, including those related to puberty. They are continuing to build respectful relationships through the BE KIND circles program, and are practising ways to express empathy, manage emotions, and understand how emotional responses can affect interactions through the Resilience Project.

HASS

This term, students will be exploring how environments can be cared for and managed responsibly. Through

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engaging lessons and hands-on activities, they will learn what it means to be sustainable, including how to conserve resources and protect natural habitats. Students will also investigate natural disasters such as floods, cyclones, bushfires, and droughts, and discover how communities can prepare for and respond to these events. By developing their understanding of environmental challenges and solutions, students will build important skills in critical thinking, problem-solving, and responsible citizenship.
